

FROM THE PASTOR

Dear GPC,

The season of Lent is drawing to a close and soon we will get ready to celebrate Holy Week and its culmination on Easter Sunday—the most important time of the Christian liturgical year. Our theme this year "Were You There?" in conjunction with my upcoming trip to Israel/Palestine, has me thinking about the people and the physical place (both then and now) where these events occurred. At this time of year Christian pilgrims descend upon Jerusalem wide eyed and excited to see the Palm Sunday parade processing down the Mount of Olives with thousands of people waving their palm branches and singing in a multitude of languages. The bread and wine of Maundy Thursday are followed by life size crosses being carried down the Via Dolorosa on Good Friday. Pilgrims journey up the mountain before the sun rises to sing loudly the "Alleluia" of Easter.

A pastor serving in Jerusalem writes, "This gut wrenching Lenten/Easter/Pentecost/Ordinary Time/Advent/Christmas/Epiphany/Transfiguration/Lent-Again trip is not a palm-waving, hymn-singing journey alongside the pilgrims making their way here, into the heart of the home of Jesus, only to board a plane and fly back to their busy lives." Here in these ancient lands, called holy by three different faith communities—Jewish, Christian and Muslim, live the people who face the challenges of everyday life. They are used to the crowds of visitors on holy days that return home saying "I've been there." In May, my hope in traveling with a group from Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School is to be able to say more than "I was there." I am eager to meet the people, hear their stories of life and struggle, amidst a seemingly intractable conflict that is tearing the fabric of this land apart. I want to be able to connect their stories to those of my faith and life.

This means learning from people who are Jewish, Christian and Muslim. Because while Christians made up 20% of the population of Israel/Palestine just 20 years ago they are now less than 2%. This is not because of tensions with Muslim neighbors. The two communities have coexisted peacefully for centuries and still do. It is the occupation and denial of human rights that makes life in Jerusalem and the occupied territories virtually unbearable for those without hope, for those who see no end to the conflict.

I look forward to learning and sharing with you the stories of the people who are there, who live and struggle today where Jesus took his final journey to the cross. And to be a witness to the hope, we believe as Christians was made manifest in Jesus resurrection.

Jamaica Advisers Wanted: Our 2017 Jamaica trip has come and gone, and it's time for us to start looking at leadership for our 2018 youth trip! The Senior High Jamaica Trip is the capstone event in GPC's youth program. The week of dedicated service from our seniors also needs devoted adult leaders.

Last year, a team of experienced youth advisers, Sunday School teachers, Youth Team members, and previous Jamaica trip leaders met with Katie and Melissa to talk about what makes a great trip leader. We agreed that future trip leaders must have experience being a committed, dependable, caring leader in GPC's youth program. They are encouraged (but not required) to have experience traveling internationally, especially for mission service. The team agreed that a balance of new and more experienced adults will provide the best long-term leadership for the Jamaica trip. We also agreed that parents may be trip leaders if they are committed to the youth program, but that being a parent does not automatically mean that they will be chosen.

Each trip will have at least three adult leaders - one pastor and two other adults. If a particular year has seniors who have special needs, their needs will be considered to make sure that each trip's leadership is a good fit for our youth. We want to make sure that each senior is comfortable on this international mission trip! Katie and Melissa will choose each year's adults with help from previous trip leaders if needed.

To make sure that no interested potential leaders are overlooked and that everyone is considered, adults must apply in order to be considered for next year's trip. If you are interested in being an adult leader for this 2018 trip (Feb. 17-24), please fill out an application form (available in the Harbinger or in the church office) and return it by April 15th. Applicants will be notified of Jamaica leadership by May 1st.

Adult advisers will work with the pastor to make sure that each senior has a safe, meaningful, eye-opening, and mission-filled week of service in Jamaica. Advisers must have experience being a committed, dependable, caring leader in GPC's youth program. Youth group leaders, Sunday School teachers, and Youth Team members will be given preference, since they have ongoing experience with our youth. Trip leaders may be parents if they are committed to the youth program, but being a parent does not automatically mean that they will be chosen. A balance of new and more experienced trip leaders is preferred.
